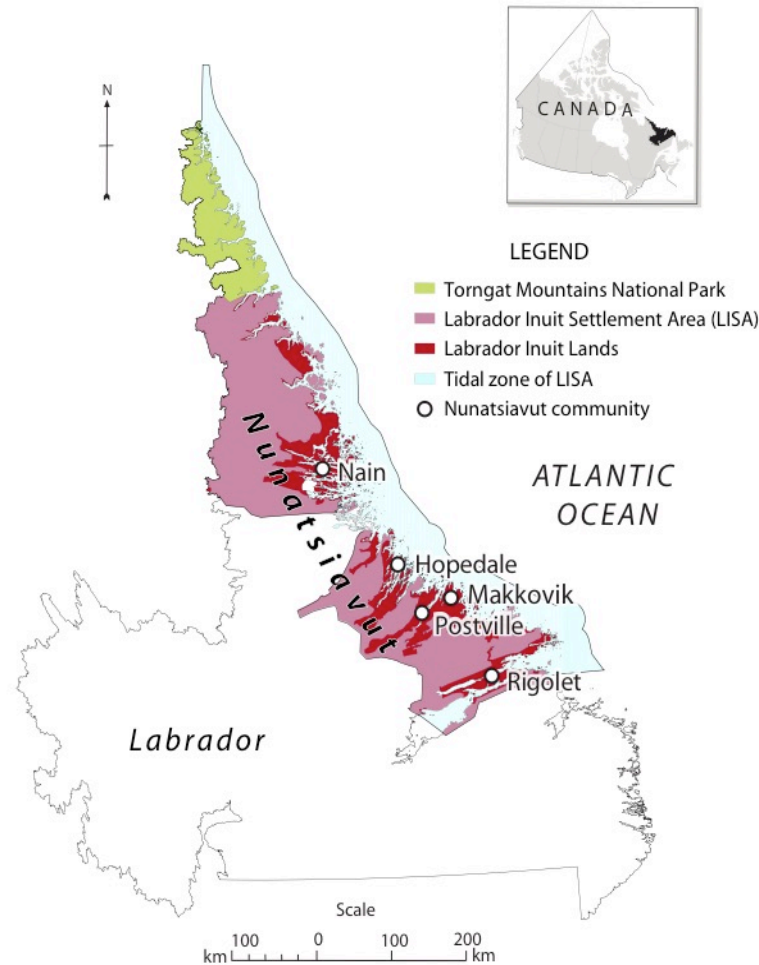

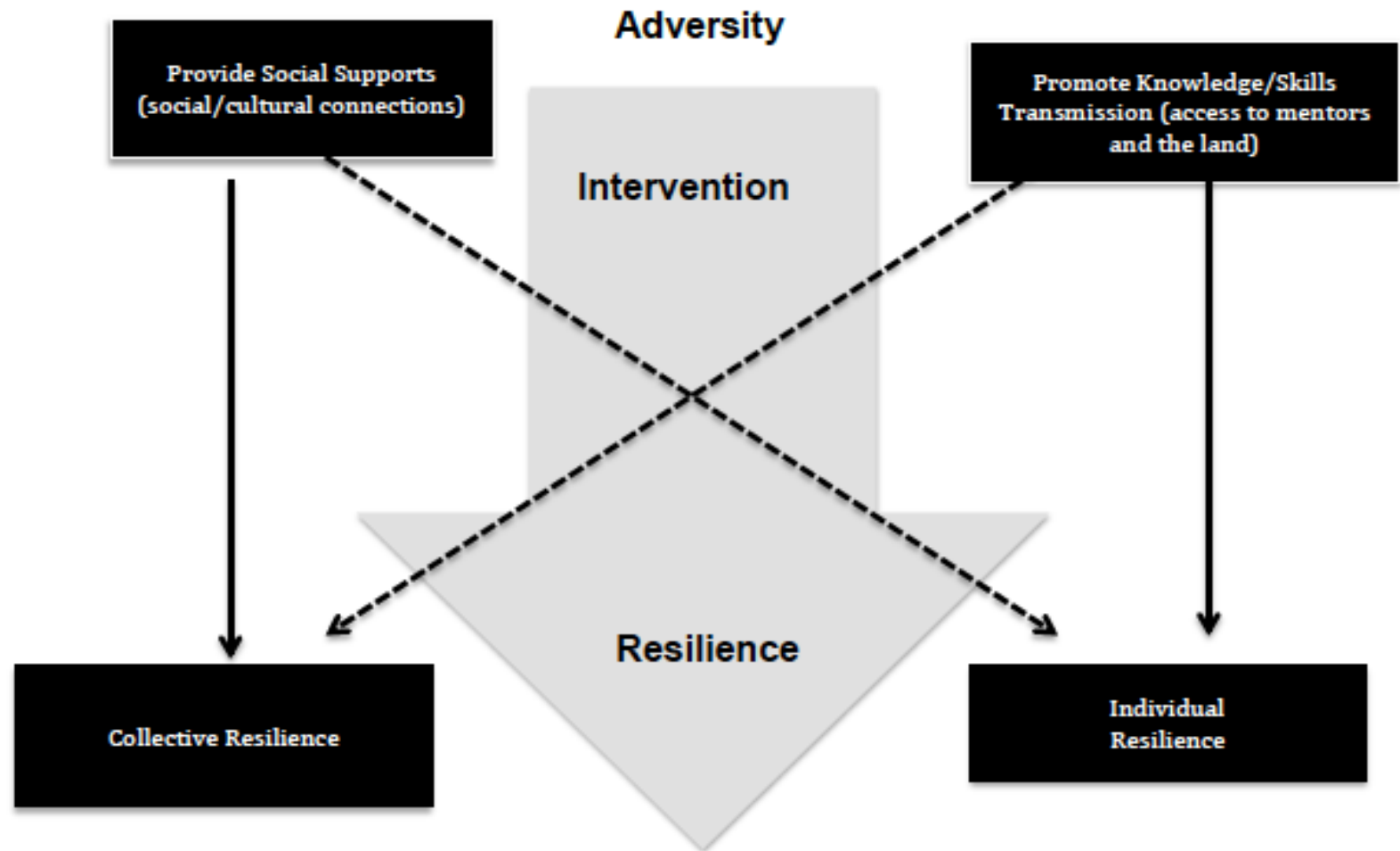

Logic model: Addressing underlying mechanisms



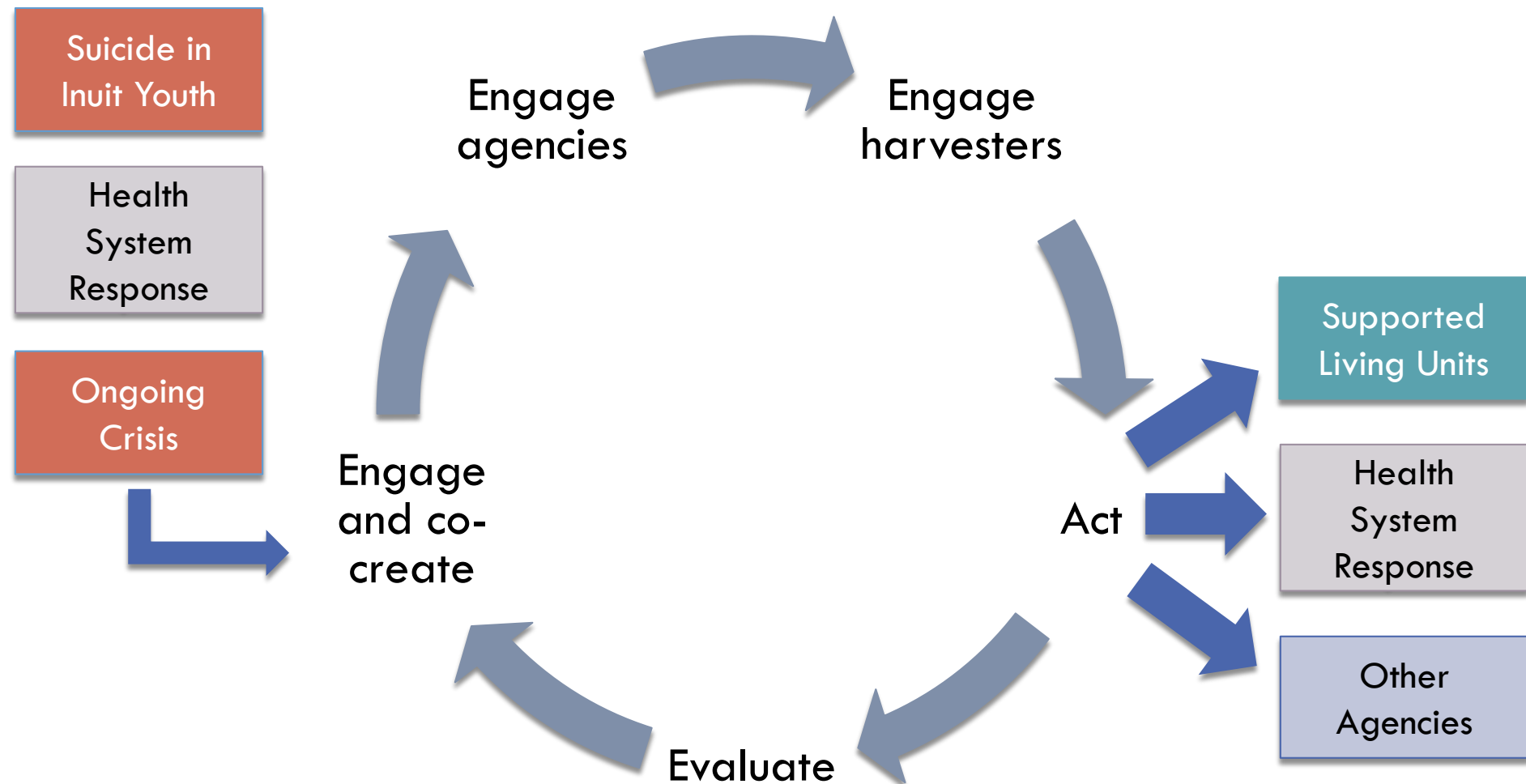

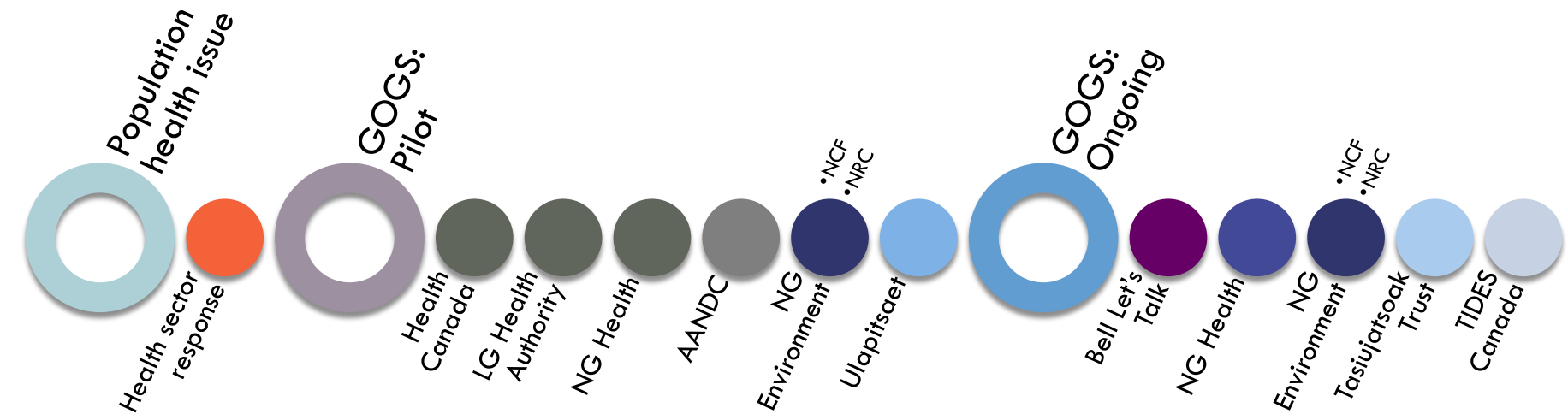

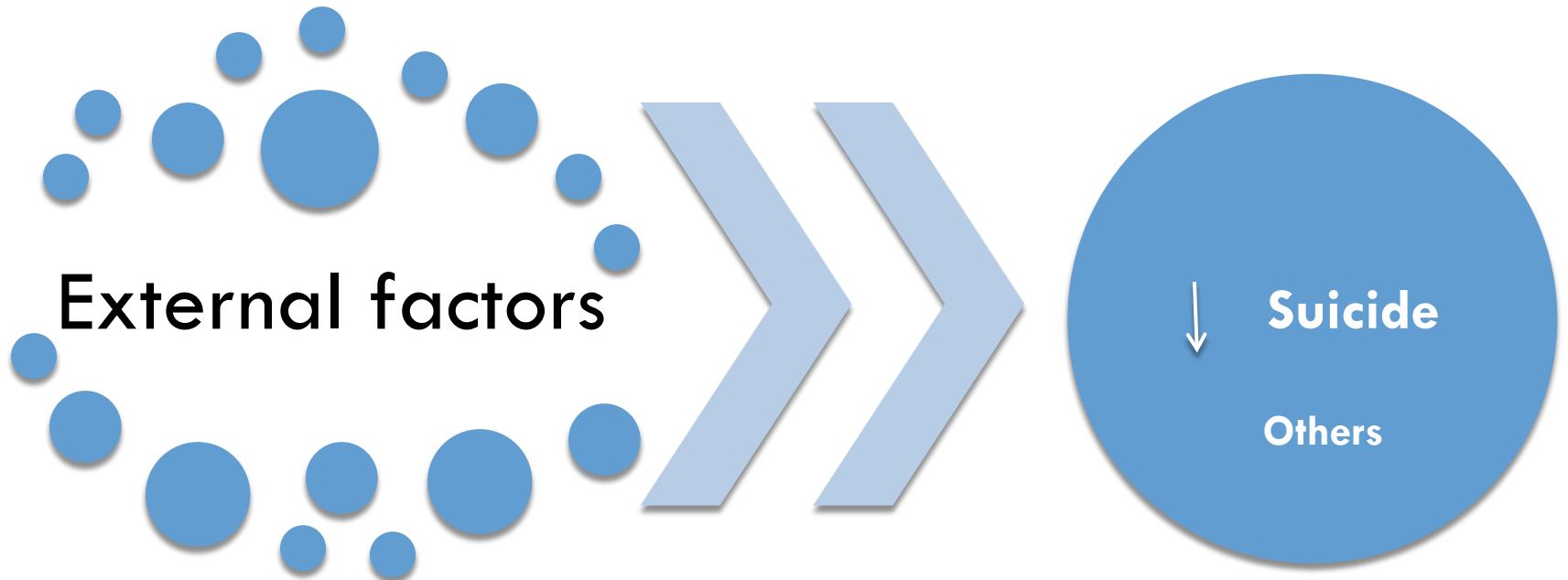
